RAMROD'S MUSINGS

From the Pokey

Breaking the 170 at the loading table.

Are you aware that the rule covering sweeping with a loaded or unloaded gun starts at the beginning of the loading table and runs to the end of the unloading table?

Did you know that when you grab your revolver by the barrel and hold it barrel down to show you don't have a round under the hammer, you may be breaking the 170.

Next time you try this, look and you'll see the muzzle is pointing straight down, 180 degrees.

If that revolver has rounds in it, that is a Match Disqualification. Learn to show the revolver to the loading table officer another way.

When showing unloaded also remember the 170.

Cowboy Logic

KIT CARSON—1809-1868

Christopher Houston "Kit" Carson became a legend in his own time, living long enough to see his frontier adventures reinvented in dime novels. Raised in Missouri, he was apprenticed as a teenager to a saddlemaker. Feeling restless, he defiantly left home in 1826 and was hired on as a herder with a caravan bound for Santa Fe. The saddlers offered a reward of one penny for his return. From Santa Fe he ventured to Taos where he fell in love with the locale and made it his home base for the rest of his life.

For the next several years, Carson ranged throughout the Rockies working as a fur trapper, learning the Native American customs and languages, but he also fought on numerous occasions against hostile warriors. From 1829-1864 he engaged in approximately 30 skirmishes and battles against warriors from various tribes.

The rendezvous of 1835 proved unusually eventful for Carson. He

shot a bullying trapper named Shunar in a mounted duel. He also traded for his first wife, a beautiful Arapaho maiden named Waanike, who gave birth to two children. Sadly, Waanike died of illness around 1838.

In 1842 Carson has hired as a guide for \$100/mo. by Lt. John C. Fremont. Over the next four years Carson accompanied Fremont on three explorations across much of the west.

Assigned to carry dispatches to Washington DC, Carson reach the nation's capital to find that he had become famous. Back in New Mexico, he was appointed an American Indian agent, and served for a decade. During the Civil War he became Lt. Col. of the First New Mexico Volunteer Infantry. By 1864 Carson was a Brig. Genl. and commanded a punitive expedition to the Texas panhandle. During the ensuing Battle of Adobe Walls, Col. Carson dueled 2,000 warriors—more than any other commander until Custer in 1876. Carson married Josefa Jaramillo in 1843, but she died in 1868 following the birth of their 7th child. Bereaved and in bad health, Carson died a month later.
