Cowboy Vocabulary Origins by Fargo<br>KRR \#93<br>SASS \#18631

The American cowboy has his roots in what is now the southwestern United States. His was a mixture of Spanish, Mexican and Anglo-American cultures. His stock in trade derived from domestic cattle and horses introduced by Spanish conquistadors and were subsequently found roaming free on open ranges.
The hardy, ill formed horses were

escapees from Spanish 'mestas' or groups of stock raisers and were referred to as 'mestenos', which were later to become known by the cowboy as mustangs.
The area which was now home to the longhorn and mustang had earlier been conquered by the Spaniards who had befriended the Indians whom they referred to as 'tejas', meaning friends or allies. The Spaniards who called the country "the land of the tejas", or as we now know it, Texas.
The Spanish ranchers hired Indians to tend their herds of 'vacas', or cows, and were called 'vaqueros', a word later corrupted by Anglo into 'buckaroos'.
When Anglos began moving into Texas they immediately assumed a racial superiority over the Mexican 'greaser', a derogatory term that originated in the days when Anglo traders bought hides and tallow from the Spaniards in California. The Mexicans, in turn, referred to the Anglos as 'gringos', an uncomplimentary name derived from the Spanish 'griego' for Greek, meaning a foreigner who spoke Greek or an unintelligible language.
'Cowboy', 'cowman', 'cow herder' and 'stock boy' were all terms used to reference the Anglo cow handler, but cowboy seemed the most appropriate because the majority of them were

young. When the great trail drives began and cattle were moved to the railheads, the cowboy had the responsibility of loading the cows onto the rail cars. Long prodpoles were used to urge the cattle through the chutes and into the cars, thus the term 'cowpuncher' or 'cowpoke'.
Though the Anglo cowboy may have been arrogant about his perceived social supremacy, he was not shy about adopting the methods and equipment of the skilled vaquero who had mastered the art of managing cows from horseback. The vaquero had developed the accoutrements needed to accomplish the task, not the least of which was 'la reata' which the cowboy soon called a 'lariat' or 'lasso' from the Spanish 'lazo' meaning noose.
The cowboy saw that the vaquero sometimes wore leather leggings to protect his legs from the thick brush and chaparral and began wearing a modified version which the Mexican called 'chaparejos', a word that was eventually shortened to 'chaps'. Likewise, the stirrup was eventually covered, to protect the feet. by a leather hood called 'tapaderas' by the Spanish and 'taps' by the cowboy.
Anchoring a cow after roping it had been perfected by the vaquero by wrapping the lariat around the saddle horn, a procedure known by them as 'da la vuelta', meaning "give a turn". The cowboy mangled the words into 'dolly welter', then 'dally'.
Though likely unaware and less likely to admit it, the American cowboy can trace most of his skills and many of the words in common use, then and today, back to the skilled vaqueros who preceded him.
