The Posse

Part of the basic structure of Cowboy Action Shooting is the "Posse". The posse is simply a group of CAS shooters. To keep this group of shooters on track we assign a "Posse Leader". It is the posse leaders duty to see that all things that should happen, do happen. One of the most important duties of the posse leader is to assign an RO/ Timer. The person that is assigned that

position must have the necessary skills and training to fill that most important spot. Who ever has the timer IS THE RO of the posse while he/she has the timer and as such must be familiar with the rules of the game and be able and willing to make the front line calls as they arise. The RO/Timer must make the calls equally and fairly. He/she must be ready, willing and able to help the shooter safely through the course of fire. The RO/Timer must be able to take control of the shooter if necessary. The RO/Timer must be sure that there are three, and only three, capable spotters ready to go before starting the shooter. One of the items that came out of the TG Summit was the need to refresh our members that act as RO/ Timers. This person should have completed the RO I course and be able to control what is happening on the firing line. He/she should be firm, but not a "Hard Ass". He/ She must also remember that they don't make the rules to suit themselves, but must follow the SASS and local rules. They must play out the scenario as written, except for safety issues. They should be able to recognize an unsafe situa-



tion, and take the necessary steps to correct it. Often, the Posse leader and the RO/Timer are the same person, but it is not necessary for that to be the case. When the RO/Timer needs to be relieved, it is imperative that the timer be passed to someone that is also qualified. New shooters, and shooters that are not experienced in CAS should NOT be handed the timer. Everyone is not cut out to be a RO/Timer, and if it is not for you, and you are not willing to take the job seriously, you should not do it! The local match is the place for shooters to get experience running the timer, but they must be experienced CAS shooters before they are allowed to step into that spot. We need as many qualified people as possible to be willing to take this position. In an effort to help us along, and to comply with the SASS directive, I will have a quick "refresher" on the next setup day before the Jan match. If you can, come out and join us. The outcome of the match and the enjoyment received from it is greatly effected by the people that run the posse. Whether you are a RO/ Timer, Spotter, Timekeeper, Loading/ Unloading officer, Brass picker or Posse Leader, your conscience efforts make a difference. EVERYONE should fall into one of these positions on every posse. TNX, and I hope to see you at the next setup day.
