Be on the lookout for the infamous squib load. Watching for squib loads in one of the major jobs of the person doing the timing. But what if the timer, the shooter, and all the spotters all miss a squib load? They are not always easily detected, and can slip by the most alert RO.

At our last match, there were two incidents of a bullet stuck in the barrel of a rifle. Both of theses went undetected until it came time to chamber another round. Fortunately both of the stuck bullets were at the very beginning of the bore, which would not allow another round to be chambered.

I don't know of any foolproof way to completely eliminate the possibility of sticking a round in the barrel, or guaranteeing that it will be detected. The obvious thing that will help is to take care when you reload your ammunition. Automatic loading presses are the biggest culprits, but it can happen when using a single stage press too. The lack of powder can be just as dangerous as a double charge when it leaves an undetected bullet stuck in the barrel. Watch your crimp too. One of the bullets is believed to have been stuck when an unfired round was ejected from the rifle. It appears that when the cartridge was placed into the chamber, the bullet was extended beyond the crimp groove. This allowed the bullet to engage the rifling when the action was closed. But the cartridge, being too long, would not chamber properly and was ejected. The bullet pulled out of the cartridge, and remained in the barrel. The next round would not chamber because it was being pushed up against the stuck bullet. LUCKY! This is only a guess as to what happened, but a empty case with an unfired primer was found in the shooters empty brass, and the bullet had no powder fowling on it.

Maybe a wooden rod at the unloading table dropped into the barrel is a good idea.

THE PASSING OF A TRUE GIANT

Today we mourn the passing of an old friend by the name of Common Sense Common Sense lived a long life but died from heart failure at the brink of the millennium. No one really knows how old he was since his birth records were long ago lost in bureaucratic red tape.

He selflessly devoted his life to service in schools, hospitals, homes, factories and offices, helping folks get jobs done without fanfare and foolishness.

For decades, petty rules, silly laws and frivolous lawsuits held no power over Common Sense. He was credited with cultivating such valued lessons as to know when to come in out of the rain, the early bird gets the worm, and life isn't always fair

Common Sense lived by simple, sound financial policies (don't spend more than you earn), reliable parenting strategies (the adults are in charge, not the kids), and it's okay to come in second.

A veteran of the Industrial Revolution, the Great Depression, and the Technological Revolution, Common sense survived cultural and educational trends including feminism, body piercing, whole language and "new math".

But his health declined when he became infected with the "If-it-onlyhelps-one-person-it's-worth-it" virus. In recent decades his waning strength proved no match for the ravages of overbearing federal regulation.

He watched in pain as good people became ruled by self-seeking lawyers and enlightened auditors. His health rapidly deteriorated when schools endlessly implemented zero tolerance policies, reports of six-year-old boys charged with sexual harassment for kissing a classmate, a teen suspended for taking a swig of mouthwash after lunch, and a teacher fired for reprimanding an unruly student. It declined even further when schools had to get parental consent to administer aspirin to a student but cannot inform the parent when the female student is pregnant or wants an abortion.

Finally, Common Sense lost his will to live as the Ten Commandments became contraband, churches became businesses, criminals received better treatment than victims, and federal judges stuck their noses in everything from Boy Scouts to professional sports.

As the end neared, Common Sense drifted in and out of logic but was kept informed of developments, regarding questionable regulations for asbestos, low flow toilets, "smart" guns, the nurturing of Prohibition Laws and mandatory air bags.

Finally when told that the homeowners association restricted exterior furniture only to that which enhanced property values, he breathed his last.

Common Sense was preceded in death by his parents Truth and Trust; his wife, Discretion; his daughter, Responsibility; and his son, Reason. He is survived by three stepbrothers: Rights, Tolerance and Whiner.

Not many attended his funeral because so few realized he was gone.

Unsafe Gun Handling Can Even Happen to "Experts"

On January 9, 1875, Wyatt Earp, then a policeman on the Wichita force,

was sitting in on a card game with some cronies when, according to the Beacon of January 12th, an unusual event occurred:

Last Sunday night, while policeman Erp was sitting with two or three others in the back room of the Custom House Saloon, his revolver slipped from it's holster and in falling to the floor the hammer which was resting on the cap, is supposed to have struck the chair, causing a discharge of one of the barrels (chambers). The ball passed through his coat, stuck the north wall then glanced off and passed out through the ceiling. It was a narrow escape and the occurrence got up a lively stampede from the room. One of the demoralized was under the impression that someone had fired through the window from the outside.

Mr. Earp evidently failed to heed his own alleged comments to his biographer Stuart N. Lake who reported that he only loaded five shoots in a six-shooter to 'ensure against accidental discharge'.
