The Kings River Regulators always provide free bottled drinking water, at the least, at every other stage and when required, every stage.

Not only drink plenty of water, but add some electrolyte replacements to that

water. Remember, water can be toxic if you drink too much.

Be sure to seek protection from the nasty rays of the sun. UV can and does cause heat stroke and cancer. Use your sun screen and stay in the shade as much as you can.

As the sun shines down it causes the cold blooded creatures, snakes, to seek the dark cool areas where

us warm blooded folks like to hang out also. Always check around the throne when you go to the little pards room and watch out when picking up targets, brass and weeds.

Another concern is that the heat causes your long guns to really heat up while staged or at the loading table. Use care when handling hot guns so you don't drop them.

Dropped rounds

The rules state that any round dropped/ejected by the shooter from the loading table to the unloading table is considered dead and cannot be picked up. Trying to pick up a dropped or ejected round is a Minor Safety Violation.

This also means that at the end of the stage you should not pick up any dropped rounds on the way to the unloading table. Let the RO or brass picker get them. Some clubs and RO's will call that a violation of the dropped round rule.

Now if you stage ammo in in a prop on a table and the ammo falls back in that prop, it's a no call.

Cowboy Logic

Mark Twain - 1835 - 1910

Samuel Clemens was a 25 year old steamboat pilot when the Civil War began, but the closing of the Mississippi ended his career on the river. His brother, **Orion**, was appointed secretary to the territorial governor of Nevada, and **Sam** accompanied him on the long stagecoach ride to the West in 1861. **Sam** unsuccessfully tried his hand at prospecting and then won a reporter's job with the Territorial Enterprise in Virginia City. He wrote under the byline "**Mark Twain**", a nautical term from his river-boat days.

In 1865 **Twain** published a short story, "*The Celebrated jumping Frog of Calaveras County*" in the New York Saturday Press. This typical western tall tale launched the literary career of one of America's greatest writers.

Roughing It, the delightful 1872 account of **Twain's** western adventures, related the story of his travels through the eyes of a greenhorn Easterner who is perplexed but entertained by colorful western characters and events. Artfully capturing the rough humor and courageous optimism of frontiersmen, **Roughing It** is a first-person classic about the Old West.
